Focus on-----Arrest

In this session the participants will look at arrests, warrants and probable cause. We will examine an arrest scenario and evaluate whether or not probable cause has been established.

Session Outcomes

As a result of this session participants will be able to-

- identify when an arrest has taken place
- describe the Fourth Amendment rights a person has during arrest
- describe factors used to determine probable cause

Saturday, October 17, 2009

8:30-10:30

Focus on-----Search and Seizure

This session will focus on the search and seizure aspects of the Fourth Amendment. The session will examine the 4th Amendment and explore the concept of reasonable and unreasonable searches.

Session Outcomes

As a result of this session participants will be able to-

- describe the Fourth Amendment requirements for searches
- weigh the individual right to privacy and the government need for information
- explain the exclusionary rule and how it protects people from unreasonable searches

10:45-12:00

Focus on -----Interrogations and Confessions

This session will look at the individual rights guaranteed in the Fifth and Sixth Amendments. We will look at the *Miranda* case and explore some of the issues surrounding the validity of confessions.

Session Outcomes

As a result of this session participants will be able to-

- identify rights that are stated in the Fifth and Sixth Amendments
- describe situations when a confession might not be admissible

- identify the rights established by the Miranda case
- define the terms “self-incrimination” and “custodial interrogation”

Focus on----- Pre-Trial Proceedings

This session will look at some pre-trial issues—including plea bargaining, bail, pre-trial release, the role of the grand jury, and pre-trial motions.

Session Outcomes

- As a result of this session participants will be able to-
- define and describe the bail process
 - identify three motions that may be filed at this stage
 - describe the exclusionary rule

2:30-2:45 Break

2:45 – 4:30

Focus on-----The Trial

This session will look at several specific issues related to the trial process—including selection of juries, right to counsel, and confrontation of witnesses.

Session Outcomes

- As a result of this session participants will be able to-
- describe the rights included in the 5th and 6th Amendments
 - describe the right to confront witnesses and how it relates to a fair trial process
 - explain why the privilege against self-incrimination is important

Focus on-----Appeals, Sentencing and Corrections

Participants will look at issues related to sentencing, corrections and the Kentucky Appeals process.

Deborah works domestically and internationally in other program areas including conflict resolution, crime prevention, and intellectual property. Deborah is a member of the National Council for the Social Studies, the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, and the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.
